





WRONGFUL IMPRISONMENT & PROSECUTION OF SCHOLARS

- SAR reported 70 incidents of wrongful prosecution and 87 incidents of wrongful imprisonment during this reporting period
- Often under laws related to terrorism, national security, and defamation



GLOBAL PRESSURES ON STUDENT EXPRESSION

- Student expression is crucial to the education process and democratic society, and is protected under international human right standards
- Last year, SAR reported more than 100 incidents connected with student expression
 - Violent attacks, arrests, prosecutions and coercive legal actions
 - University disciplinary measures
 - Student violence that threatens safety of campus community








KEY TAKEAWAYS:

- Continuing phenomenon of attacks on higher education around the world, by state and non-state actors, in both closed and open societies
 - These attacks undermine the quality of higher education research and teaching and threaten scientific, economic, and cultural progress
- Common motivation to punish learning and silence ideas
 - Deprive the public of the benefits of research, innovation, and debate
 - Shrink the space in which we should all be free to think, question, and share ideas
- Global phenomenon requires global response







SAR CALLS ON STATES TO:

- Reject violence and coercion aimed at restricting inquiry and expression;
- Protect threatened students, scholars, and universities; and
- Reaffirm publicly their support for the principles that critical discourse is not disloyalty, that ideas are not crimes





SAR CALLS ON HIGHER EDUCATION INSTITUTIONS AND SOCIETIES TO:

- Join the Scholars at Risk Network and commit to the principle that scholars should be free to work without fear or intimidation;
- Speak about academic freedom and attacks on higher education at events on campus and to the public;
- Demonstrate support for scholars impacted by attacks by offering temporary positions of academic refuge to these individuals; and
- Encourage research into and teaching of academic freedom, and encourage academic conferences to explore the topic.
